Our neighbours are the people we already connect with through the Mens' Shed, the Library, Coffee and Friends group, Craft groups, Computer for Seniors group, #Stop the Shame, the Australian Religious Response to Climate Change (ARRCC) as well as those who use our halls and facilities for activities in the community.

The First Peoples of the Yuin nation are our neighbours and call us to join them in valuing and respecting the land.

Berry is a "creative town" with a diversity of activities, which has become a destination of choice. We understand that Jesus' mission and ministry was to "outsiders" and we believe that so too is ours. We are called to be people who let Jesus shine through our "cracked lives".

We believe that developing and building relationships with all our neighbours is a crucial element in the renewal of mission

WHAT DO WE NEED TO BE & DO (What is GOD leading us to be/do)

We believe we need to be "good neighbours" who build relationships first and foremost. We need to follow the call of Jesus to be "salt & light" in the community by being 'doers' not just 'talkers' as we share the good news that we have received. As Micah 6:8 says we are to "do justice, love mercy and walk humbly with God".

In order to do this we need to be aware of what is happening in our community. We need to be as open as we can to those around us. We need to take up the challenge to engage with people through visiting and building relationships. To be prepared to be the "Good Samaritan" within our own community as we "go to" where people are rather than expecting them to come to us.

We need to consider how we might conduct an "evangelical outreach" program and help people to learn more about God and Christianity. In this we might consider ways in which we could teach and disciple people in nurturing their faith.

We need to commit ourselves to being dedicated to where God might be leading us and to seek for what it is that God wants us to be and do. In this seeking we should expect to be surprised by God. In order to do this we might consider developing small house groups which have "holy conversations" and which explore and study our Christian Scriptures and traditions.

We need to simply do the best we can and not be afraid of our own vulnerability and do all that we do with love and grace.

We need to be people who are trustworthy and reliable as we accept the challenges that will come to us to change with and openness and inclusivity.

As the people of God, we need to develop a greater awareness of the presence of the "sacred" and offer "sacred space" and "presence" to people within our community. We need to provide opportunities to engage in "spiritual formation"

In summary, what are most people in your community like?

- The median age of people in your local community is 57 years old. The most common age group is 65 to 69 years. The female/male ratio is 52:48.
- Most commonly, people over 15 years of age have completed up to year 12 at school. The majority of people over 15 do have a non-school qualification. The most common type of qualification is a certificate.
- The most common employment status is not in the labour force. Of those working, the most common occupation is managers and professionals and the most common industry that employs people is health care & social assistance. Individual gross weekly income most commonly falls between \$400 and \$799 per week. Gross family income most commonly falls between \$1250 and \$1999 per week.
- In your area, households are most likely to be a family household. The most common family type is a couple family with no children living in the household. The most common registered marital status of people over 15 is married.
- It is most common for people to live in accommodation that is fully owned. The most common type of dwelling is a separate house.
- Most people were born in Australia and speak only English at home. Of those born overseas the most common birthplace is United Kingdom.

The Berry Community is established and has developed from a largely rural farming community to a popular retirement and holiday community. On any given day, and especially on weekends, the town is alive with visitors. There is a healthy café culture with boutique shops and arts & crafts.

There are a number of families living in Berry with 26% of households having at least one child, however the median age is 57 years. It is therefore a mixture of families and retirees. The education level is generally higher than in most of the Shoalhaven with 54% having a tertiary education.

The Berry Congregation is active and involved in its wider community, It is largely representative of the older demographic of the community There is a strong sense of the importance of social justice issues such as Refugee and Environmental advocacy.

There are retirement facilities in the community in which several members are resident. Uniting has recently bought out a BUPA Facility in Berry. On either side of the church there are attractive and well-developed town houses which were built on land sold by the Church to a developer.

The Church building is located in the centre of Berry and has excellent facilities and buildings which are well utilised by community groups. There is a very successful Men's Shed which is well attended and used by both men and women in the community. This is a good example of a community engagement, although there is a disconnect between the Men's Shed and the Church. The same could be said for the many groups that rent the Church buildings. The Church also runs a Community Library and is the auspice body for a community garden which are also a very successful examples of a community engagement. There is a Manse which is tenanted. They have good income from rentals of their buildings and in many ways the Berry Church facilities are seen as a good resource within the community.

The Services are well attended, and the traditional style of worship is appreciated by those who attend. There are excellent IT/AV facilities in the Church and the Library and the Hall which has allowed for a very efficient online presence. They have transitioned to a hybrid worship which uses both online and in-person worship.

The Church is currently only able to afford a 45% Ministry Agent which is somewhat limiting in terms of developing new mission & ministry. There are several retired Clergy that are available to fill in when required. There are enthusiastic and committed people who are willing to be involved with the work of the Congregation.

Berry Congregation is very open to moving forward and finding new ways to be at Mission in the Community.
